#### **Capitalism comes to Tibet**

According to the Chinese paper Sing Tao (January 11, 2001), a New Zealander has cleared all the bureaucratic hurdles and is getting set to start building the highest altitude hotel in the world. It will be built on the Tibetan side of Mt. Everest or, as it is called in Tibetan. Chomulangma at an altitude of 21.648 feet. The hotel will have 52 rooms at around US \$100 a night.

The project will cost around US \$3.2 million. Representatives of the China-Tibet Mountain Climbers Association are in support of the venture, But many environmentalists and mountain climbers in and out of China oppose the project. #### **Book Review**

### In a Sunburned Country by Bill Bryson

mentioned to John Klebes that I was reading In a Sunburned Country by Bill Bryson, since he had just reviewed Bill Bryson's more famous book, A Walk in the Woods. He suggested that I write a review for "Bootprints," so here it is.

Bill Bryson is America's best travel writer. And what makes his books a joy to read is his humor. If you have read A Walk in the Woods and you thought that that book was funny, In a Sunburned Country also has a number of passages that will make you roar with laughter.

Bryson paints a paradoxical picture of Australia, the land Down Under. He scares the hell out of you by saying that there are any number of natural things that will either make your life miserable or do you in in Australia (i.e. crocodiles, pesky flies, biting ants, deadly snakes, poisonous spiders, lethal jellyfish and octopi, and, of course, sharks.) The vast open spaces of water deficient deserts in the Outback with mind-numbing temperatures won't do you any favors, either. But after Bryson writes so many negative things, who would ever want to visit the God-forsaken place?

On the other hand, Bryson loves Australia. He visits all the major cities of Australia, and ventures into the Outback. He walks a tremendous amount, especially in the major cities, often trying to find some landmark or an obscure site of personal interest that he's read about. Bryson does a tremendous amount of research on Australia, and it shines through in his writing. He wonders why we rarely hear anything newsworthy from the country, and posits that Australia is truly a forgotten land. He also finds the optimism of the people of Australia captivating, especially considering the natural obstacles that they have had to overcome.

Bryson starts the book by scaring the hell out of you (undoubtedly trying to provoke interest in his subject), and notes the irony of the way Australians do things. I thought the tone of the book towards the Australian people at the beginning was a bit harsh at times. But he settles in and finds humor, and occasional disgust, in just about everything. In a Sunburned Country is a big book, three hundred pages long. It is filled with more trivia about Australia than you would wish to know. However, if you are going to Australia, or have an interest in the country after watching the recent Survivor series on television, or would like a hilarious or extremely well written book to read, then this is the one for you. - Dick Forrest-
