So, we came down Hi-Cannon (I hate ladders and ledges, but really ladders) to Dodge Cut off and then down Lonesome Lake Trail. Saw the Caretaker of 2 weeks ago on the way down, Heidi - very nice young lady.

It started raining as we were going down Kinnsman Ridge Trail, so we had some really nice views going up Hi Cannon and on the top. Terrific views of Lafayette and Lincoln and the Lafayette campground from the Rim Ridge trail. As we were going towards the ladder and ledge on the way down, the rain and wind was quite intense, but eased as we approached the ledge. Twelvepoint crampons (Grivel) worked wonderfully as did the rope I used to traverse from the ladder across the ledge - no hand holds, so we made one for me - the rope.

to the col. Our plan was to camp in the col and hike out via Mt Washington and the Lions Head trail.

Keep in mind that even though winter is officially over this is the White Mountains and home of the worst weather ever recorded. The Great Gulf side is known for itcs snow and due to itcs remote approach is not very

popular this time of year. Starting out at the lower elevations there was no snow and bridges over most of the stream crossings, including a neat suspension bridge. But as we climbed higher the snow became deep. We switched to snowshoes and it became increasingly difficult to pick out the trail through the snow, ice, and difficult terrain. And the STREAM CROSSINGS, %ay favorite part+, got more and more, shall I say, interesting!

The river views and waterfalls were fantastic and the iceflows on the headwall were unbelievable. During a traverse out to look at Wetamoo Cascade I had a snow-bridge cave-in and got a little wet. It was like riding a bike through the air . a section of the snow bridge fell into the water and I scrambled to the next section, which fell and I scrambled to the next, and the next. Rick Briggs said it was the funniest thing he ever watched. Wish he had his camera out.

We had trouble following the Sphinx trail and finally started bushwhacking up toward the headwall on steep angled snow. I don't thing anyone else is silly enough to try hiking this trail this winter? It was very hard work on snowshoes and full winter backpacks. We ended up carving a shelf on the slope of Mt Clay and setting up camp below about the 5000 feet level. Good thing I brought snow shovel!

We had thought that Sunday would be the better day and had hoped to try bushwhacking back toward the headwall but it started snowing during the night and never stopped all morning Sunday until we hiked out. Not a lot, about three inches, but constantly coming down so no views to guide us to a climbable route. And you dong want to wander around for too many hours bushwacking on the rugged spruce and rocks on the

Gulf side of Washington!

Saturday night the snow started as freezing rain that stuck like glue to the tent - then the snow stuck to the frozen rain. I had to carry most of the snow and ice out with the tent when we packed up Sunday morning.

Sunday we hiked out the bushwack on snowshoes but had to switch to crampons on the Great Gulf Trail due to the ice. We are planning on trying again next year.

Oh, almost forgot, we saw a moose on the drive in.

Hunting for Treasure

Looking for a new hobby to get you out into the great outdoors? How about trying out Letterboxing, or the high-tech version Geocaching? Both combine elements of a scavenger hunt, hiking, orienteering, map reading, puzzle solving and creative expression in a unique activity that's growing in popularity.

Geocaching is an outdoor activity that involves the use of a Global Positioning System ("GPS") receiver to find a "geocache" placed anywhere in the world. A typical cache is a small, waterproof container containing a logbook and "treasureö. Participants are called geocachers. For more information check out: www.geocaching.com

Geocaching is similar to a much older activity called letterboxing. The major difference is its use of the GPS and the Internet. There are also nearly 20,000 letterboxes hidden in the U.S. today, but you'll only find them if you can correctly follow the clues. Once you've found a letterbox, record your discovery in its log using your personal rubber stamp, and stamp the

letterbox's stamp in your personal journal. For more information see: www.letterboxing.org
